What is an Apprenticeship?

Apprenticeships combine practical training in a job with study.

It is a genuine job for which you will receive a wage

An apprentice works alongside experienced staff to gain jobspecific skills and earn a wage (including holiday pay)

Apprentices are given time for study related to the role (usually the equivalent of one day a week)



Entry requirements for an Apprenticeship

Anyone over the age of 16, living in England (no upper age limit). The National Apprenticeship Service is committed to ensuring that high quality apprenticeships are a prestigious option, accessible to all people from all backgrounds.

All vacancies on Find an apprenticeship will clearly state what the entry requirements are for the job role being advertised.



Apprenticeships and additional needs

There will be different entry requirements depending on the industry, job role and apprenticeship level.

Recent changes to the minimum English and maths requirements now mean that people with a learning difficulty or disability can access a level 2 intermediate apprenticeship as long as they can achieve an entry level 3 qualification during their apprenticeship.



What levels of Apprenticeship are there?

Name	Level	Equivalent educational level		
Intermediate	2	5 GCSE passes at grade A*– C or 9 – 4		
Advanced	3	2 A level passes/Level 3 Diploma/ International Baccalaureate		
Higher	4, 5, 6 and 7	Foundation degree and above		
Degree	6 and 7	Bachelor's or master's degree		



What can I do an Apprenticeship in?

There are apprenticeships available at intermediate, advanced, higher and degree levels.

These cover more than 1,500 job roles across 170 industries, from Nursing to Graphic Design, Horticulture to Electric Vehicle Engineering, Advertising to Nuclear Decommissioning.

Up to 27,000 quality apprenticeship vacancies are available online at any one time at www.gov.uk/apply-apprenticeship advertising real jobs, with real employers paying real salaries.



Why do an Apprenticeship?

- Earn a real wage
- Training in the skills employers want;
- Apprentices enjoy salary increases when they complete their training (those completing a higher apprenticeship could see increased earnings of an estimated £150,000 over their lifetime.)





How much can an apprentice earn?

The national minimum wage (NMW) for apprentices is £3.90 per hour from April 2019. The apprentice NMW applies to apprentices aged under 19 or aged 19 or over and in the first year of their apprenticeship. Many earn more than this.

Year	25 and over	21 to 24	18 to 20	Under 18
April 2019	£8.21	£7.70	£6.15	£4.34
