### Job name: Copy editor

**Job description:** Copy editors make sure text is clear, consistent, correct and complete, ready for publishing in printed and online publications.

#### Tasks you will undertake in the job: As a Copy Editor you'll:

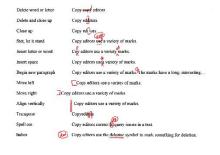
- Typically you may work on raw or draft text to:
- correct spelling, grammar and punctuation errors
- check the length of the text fits in with publisher requirements
- make sure the text is in the right style for the intended audience
- apply a 'house-style' to copy written by more than one writer
- make sure the meaning of the text is clear
- check that references are correct and that pictures and tables have the right captions
- check for legal issues like libel or breach of copyright
- mark up queries, revisions or items that need legal permission to use

You could become a features writer, chief sub-editor or production editor. Many copy editors work freelance.

**Salary:** Copy Editors are typically paid a starting wage of £22 000, this increases with experience; experienced Copy Editors can expect to earn approximately £46 000 p.a.

Working hours: Working hours are usually around 37-39 hours per week (variable). It is likely that you will work during some evenings and weekends (or on your own schedule if you are self-employed – see below)



### Qualifications to become a Copy Editor:

You can get into this job through: a university course; an apprenticeship; working towards this role; specialist training courses with professional bodies or a graduate training scheme

Many copy editors have a degree. Most subjects are accepted. A degree in publishing, media, English or a related subject may improve your chances of finding work. To work for a specialist publisher, for example of scientific or technical publications, employers will prefer you to have subject matter expertise through a related degree.

**Benefits and limitations of self-employment:** Many Copy Editors are self-employed, they work for themselves and not a company. This means they have to find their own clients / customers and manage their own accounts including taxes and insurance costs. - knowledge of English language; excellent written and verbal communication skills
- knowledge of media production and communication
- to be thorough and pay attention to detail
- the ability to work well with others and the ability to accept criticism and work well under pressure
- the ability to use your initiative
- to be able to use a computer and the main software packages competently
