Our Academy has been awarded the prestigious Global Inclusion Award at the IFIB and UNESCO Global Inclusion Awards 2024. This international recognition highlights the school's exceptional commitment to fostering inclusivity. We achieved the award alongside other academic institutions from 39 countries across the world.

Judges at the IFIB Global Inclusion Awards said this award was given as a mark of 'sincere respect, admiration, and high praise' for Kingswood Secondary Academy's efforts, attainment and leadership in this changing world to be more inclusive. This accolade acknowledges the school's unwavering dedication to creating an environment where every student feels valued and supported.

The IFIB Global Inclusion Awards, co-organised by UNESCO and the International Forums of Inclusion Practitioners (IFIP), represents a significant leap forward in promoting inclusion on an international scale. These awards serve as a unifying platform, showcasing the finest inclusion strategies across the education sector, while drawing inspiration from diverse sectors worldwide.

Our core vision is to provide the very best education for all students to enable them to achieve their full potential to take the appropriate next steps in their lives as valued and confident members of society. We implemented a specialised programme focussed on building their key RISE values of Respect, Independence, Service to community and Empathy. Students from all keys groups at Kingswood have performed well in their examinations and above national levels. This initiative was met with great acclaim by the judges at the IFIB Global Inclusion Awards.

Principal, Matt Gamble, represented Kingswood Secondary Academy at a special award ceremony called 'Celebrating Inclusion in Education: 30th Anniversary of the Salamanca Declaration', held at the UNESCO Headquarters in Paris. This event brought together representatives from across the global education sector to discuss policies and initiatives for prioritising and promoting inclusion in education.

At the event, participants reflected on the Salamanca Statement, which established the fundamental principle of inclusion in education, emphasising that "all children should learn together, wherever possible, regardless of any difficulties or differences they may have." This statement underscores the importance of recognising and responding to the diverse needs of pupils within inclusive schools which is a fundamental belief shared by Kingswood.

Matt Gamble said: "Receiving the Global Inclusion Award is a tremendous honour and a testament to the dedication of our entire school community to create an inclusive environment where every student can thrive. We are blessed to have such a wonderful body of staff at Kingswood who go above and beyond on a daily basis to support our students to be successful. It is a privilege to receive this award on behalf of everyone at Kingswood."

Our Year 12 students recently attended the National Apprenticeship Show in Milton Keynes. Although many see university as their first choice destination, it was really pleasing to see our students exploring their options and actively engaging with the employers.

With the Easter Holidays upon us, it is important to remind all our students to keep a healthy balance between study and rest. Here are some helpful tips:

1. Establish a routine: Go through each subject and list the key topics to revise and any deadlines for coursework. Then, create a schedule of how to tackle your workload. Have an overview of what you need to achieve, and then break it down into weekly to-do lists. Don't overwhelm yourself: leave some room for the inevitable Netflix binges, meeting up with friends and getting out into the fresh air.

2. Set up a workspace: Designate a space for the sole purpose of productivity. Dividing your space between leisure and work is the key to avoiding distraction. Have a timer handy and try the Pomodoro Study technique discussed in assembly and form time. Stay clear of social media when revising!

3. Reward yourself (or even better, get your parents to reward you!): Set rewards for key study milestones - whether that is going downstairs for a coffee and a biscuit, going out with friends or even a spot of retail therapy!

4. Don't overdo it: As mentioned in our assembly on Cognitive Load Theory, rest is the key to retaining information, so make sure your hard work isn't fruitless, and get in your eight hours' sleep!

All Sixth Form students have access to study independently. This includes directed study sessions in the Sixth Form area, access to computers for research purposes and the use of the Learning Resource Centre.





STEM Careers

On Tuesday 27th February approximately 100 Year 9 students participated in a STEM activity designing, building and programming Lego robots to move, follow courses, pick up or bulldoze items. The project was aimed primarily at encouraging more girls to follow STEM subjects. Students showed a great deal of creativity, resilience and teamwork, making decisions and developing digital literacy skills, communicating with each other and organising their work space and ideas: all of our Core competencies (the skills that local employers look for in their employees). Feedback from the presenter from EKO was extremely positive, commenting on the level of engagement and interest in the activity and students' skills in being able to work together to achieve a goal. The students were enthused and very keen to show their designs and their ability to program the robot they had created. They have gained greater knowledge and understanding of STEM careers and possible routes to A Levels and higher education. A wonderful day, well done everyone!

Mr Wigfield's remarkable journey to Kingswood began with a heartfelt request from his granddaughter to the local community, asking for birthday cards to celebrate his milestone centenary. Moved by this touching initiative, the Curriculum Lead for Humanities at Kingswood Secondary Academy, Zoe Paul, saw an opportunity for Year 9 students, who are studying World War II, to participate in this special event. Each student was given the chance to pen their own personal message on a card which was then sent to Mr Wigfield.



Year 12 students visit Auschwitz

Since 1999 over 30,000 students and teachers have taken part in the Holocaust Educational Trust's ground-breaking 'Lessons from Auschwitz' Project. It is based on the premise that 'hearing is not like seeing' and it explores the universal lessons of the Holocaust and its relevance for today. Six of our Year 12 pupils were lucky enough to participate in a one-day visit to Poland on Wednesday 13th March as well as participating in two online seminars. Parking and access to Kingswood Secondary Academy:

Wherever possible we encourage our students to walk or cycle to the Academy for the obvious health and environmental benefits this brings.

If you do bring your child by car, please can you note the following:

Dropping off your child in the morning:

It would be most helpful if you could drop off your child a few hundred metres from school and they walk the short distance in.

If you do wish to use our roundabout then we do allow this in the mornings. This works because parents drop off their children over a 30-45 minute period, so congestion does not tend to be a significant issue.

Collecting your child at the end of the day:

Due to the inevitable departure of students in a relatively short period of time at the end of a school day, it does not work for us to allow parents onto site to collect their child. This is because of the very significant congestion caused which leads to vehicles backing up out of our entrance, in turn blocking Gainsborough Road in both directions.

In summary: please do not drive onto our school site to collect your child at the end of the day.

Exception: If your child has a disability then please speak with their Head of Year or Miss Skorwider in our Special Educational Needs Department who will make appropriate arrangements.

Sadly, we quite often get complaints from local residents e.g. on Tower Hill Road and Oak Wood Drive. With this in mind, we'd be very grateful if you note the following:

Please park considerately and consider parking further away and allowing your child to walk for a couple of minutes to get to you, so you can park in a less congested location.

Please avoid blocking residents' drives and do not use residents' drives to turn around in or stop in. Please avoid parking on yellow lines.
